Understanding Assembly Bill (AB) 1111: Common Course Numbering Implementation

What is **AB 1111?**

AB 1111 requires all California community colleges to implement a uniform course numbering system. This means that courses with identical and similar content will share the same course number and title across the 115 community colleges in the state. The purpose is to streamline course selection, making it easier for students to recognize equivalent courses at different colleges and complete their academic goals successfully.

For example, below is an "Introduction to Psychology" course that is being offered at Citrus College and two other community colleges.

- College: Citrus College
 Course Prefix and Number: PSY 101
 Common Course Numbering: PSYC C1000
- College: Mt. San Antonio College Course Prefix and Number: PSYC 1A Common Course Numbering: PSYC C1000
- College: Pasadena City College Course Prefix and Number: PSYC 001 Common Course Numbering: PSYC C1000

How will this benefit you?

- Simplified Course Matching: It will be easier to recognize courses that are equivalent when attending different California community colleges.
- Clearer Pathways: Choosing the right courses for your degree or certificate program will become more straightforward.
- Better Consistency: A uniform numbering system reduces confusion caused by varying course numbering across colleges.

When will this happen?

Initially, the bill required implementation by July 1, 2024. However, a subsequent bill, AB 3290, extended the deadline to July 1, 2027.

The implementation will occur in three phases:

- Phase 1: Implementation date of fall 2025
- · Phase 2: Implementation date of fall 2026
- · Phase 3: Implementation date of fall 2027

What does this mean for you?

- Course numbers at Citrus College and other community colleges will be updated to match the new system.
- The updates primarily involve changes to course prefixes, numbers, and titles, while the content and quality of the courses remain the same.

What are the courses?

The courses are general education courses that are listed on the California General Education Transfer Curriculum (Cal-GETC) pattern

which meet the California State University (CSU) and University of California (UC) general education requirements.

Phase 2 and Phase 3 courses are still pending.

How does this affect your plans to transfer to California State University (CSU) or the University of California (UC)?

The courses in all phases are primarily aligned with the CSU and UC general education pattern, known as Cal-GETC. This allows transfer students to use these courses to meet general education requirements once they are approved or re-approved. Efforts are also underway with CSU and UC partners to ensure these courses are accepted for specific major requirements where applicable.
