Catalog Course Description

This course examines the complex, dynamic relationship between communities and the justice system in addressing crime and conflict with an emphasis on the challenges and prospects of administering justice within a diverse multicultural population. Topics may include the consensus and conflicting values in culture, religion, and law. 54 lecture hours.

- Identify and explain key issues that pose conflict between diverse communities and the courts, police, and corrections
- Identify and describe the strategies for the administration of justice in a multicultural society

Examples of Required Writing Assignments

Students will identify a local community issue, review literature and electronic databases to gain information about the topic and prepare a four to five page report in APA format which identifies the topic and provides statistics and/or examples of the issue and its impact on the relationship between the community and the administration of justice system. Students will identify and recommend a strategy to minimize conflict and enhance this relationship.
