## Catalog Course Description

An objective approach to form, space, and color concepts using oil or acrylic paint. Includes critical examination of paintings for technical and aesthetic concerns, content, and historical/cultural influences. 36 lecture hours, 72 lab hours

## Course Objectives

- Analyze traditional painting subjects for value content and apply knowledge of painting materials and techniques to rendering of the subjects.
- Apply principles of basic color theory and local color theory in painting.
- Apply principles of perspective, form and space as they relate to traditional painting
- Assess and evaluate representational and non-representational paintings based on color and compositional criteria.
- Assess paintings for aesthetic qualities.
- Explain how technique, color, and composition contribute to overall content (meaning) of paintings.
- Participate in critical analysis of paintings, to include discussion of technical concerns, meanings (cultural, historical, emotional, etc.), and their contexts.

b. Light and shadow on basic forms
c. Painting using neutrals to create representation of volumetric forms
2. Color Theory
a. Scientific relationships of colors (basic color theory)
b. Effects of light on colored objects

d. Methods of mixing paints
e. Using a limited palette to paint traditional subjects
3. Composition
a. Historical approaches to use of space
b. Historical approaches to depiction of perspective, form, and light
c. Abstraction
d. Creating content
e. Recognizing cultural, emotional and aesthetic content
4. Critical Analysis of Class Assignments and Museum/Gallery Art
a. Technical concerns
b. Aesthetic qualities
c. Content subject matter, style, use of color, value, and meanings
d. Historical, cultural, and theoretical influences on painting approaches
