Catalog Course Description

This course will increase the level of cultural literacy and awareness for students by examining the complexities of interpersonal relationships within the diverse cultures and ethnic groups in our society. Students will examine their attitudes and cultural perceptions, while exploring self-concepts, values, beliefs, communication styles, religion, gender, ageism, and lifestyles in order to increase respect for cultural differences and to develop a sense of community and advocacy. The course will also explore how culture and diversity differences impact the world of work. 54 lecture hours.

Course Objectives

- Demonstrate how one's own cultural background and experiences have influenced one's attitudes, beliefs, values, and biases.
- Compare and contrast human diversity by exploring cultural beliefs and attitudes in a nonjudgmental fashion.
- Compare and contrast verbal and non-verbal communication styles and differences. Compare and contrast how our individual styles of communication may clash with others, different from oneself.
- Demonstrate specific knowledge and information about particular groups and discuss life experiences, cultural heritage, family systems, and historical background of identified culturally different individuals.
- Analyze how socio-political and economic influences impact selfesteem and self-concept
- Participate in activities outside the academic setting (e.g., community events, social, political, religious functions, celebrations, friendships, neighborhood groups and the like), to clarify one's role in social justice, advocacy, and conflict resolution, and to facilitate one's knowledge of culturally different groups.

Examples of Required Writing Assignments

Writing/Skill Building Students use the concepts and theories learned in the class to analyze their own culture, while they compare and contrast cultural diversity from the course objective areas.

Example: Take an in-depth look at your own culture, and the variations within it. Explore dividing lines within your own culture such as, socio-economic status, skin tone, education levels, religion, and the like. Examine how you would handle future situations with someone of your own culture, where some of these issues are present. Pay attention to what personal biases/ethical issues that may come up for you. Write a two page summary (depth not breadth) on what you discovered. Be prepared to share and discuss your findings with peers/instructor.

1. One (1): Two (2) page typewritten Summary regarding the Personal Experience Activity 2. One (1): Five (5) page formal typewritten Research Paper of an Ethnic Group/Culture of choice. 3. One (1): Two (2) page

typewritten Summary regarding the Research of one's own Ethnic Group/Culture.

Examples of Outside Assignments

Students use the terms, concepts and theories learned in the class to analyze, compare and contrast their own culture and other cultures from the course objective areas.

Example 1: Complete weekly take home chapter quizzes.

Example 2: Select a cultural group of interest to you. Immerse yourself into that culture for a minimum of three days. Write a two-page Personal Experience Summary regarding your experience functioning in a culture different from your own.

Example 3: Research your own culture based upon the 12-Aspects of Culture. Write a two-page summary of your findings.
