Catalog Course Description

This course is an in-depth performance experience focusing on styles of body movement for musical theatre stage productions. The fundamentals of dance will be reviewed, including beginning ballet positions and exercises and beginning tap. Concepts of the history of dance in musical stage will also be explored. 36 lecture hours, 108 lab hours.

Course Objectives

- demonstrate familiarity with specialized vocabulary and notations used in choreography
- demonstrate ability to perform basic warm-up routines and procedures
- demonstrate ability to perform beginning level choreographed dances of standard musical stage
- demonstrate ability to perform beginning level ballet positions and exercises
- · demonstrate an ability to perform the beginning level of tap
- demonstrate the ability to transform musical concepts into choreographed
- demonstrate knowledge of the basic level of history and advancement of Musical Theatre productions

Major Course Content

- 1. Fundamentals of Dance
 - a. Theater dance/movement terminology
 - b. Positions and exercises and their correct usage
 - c. Beginning level ballet terms and technique
 - Standard musical theater dance, including partner work, character movement
- 2. History of Dance in Musical Theater
 - a. Development of character through movement
 - History of dance in the theater from vaudeville to present-day modern, jazz and tap dance

- 3. Preparation of Musical Theater Production
 - a. Learning the choreography/blocking
 - b. Learning the score
 - c. Learning individual movement and parts
 - d. Individual work with students to develop character movement
 - e. Final Performance/Project
- 4. Critique of performance/project; what did and did not work and why
- 5. Improvements to be made for further performances/projects
