Catalog Course Description

This course prepares intermediate ESL students for Level 5 reading and writing. It includes grammar, vocabulary, and the writing skills of sentence and paragraph development. This course previews essay development and writing. This course also is designed to facilitate appropriate strategies for improving reading comprehension, vocabulary, and idiom usage. Emphasis is on college-level reading skills. This is one of two courses in ESL Level 4. NOTE: THE UNITS EARNED FOR THIS COURSE MAY NOT BE APPLIED TOWARD THE 60 UNITS FOR GRADUATION. 90 lecture hours.

Course Objectives

- Read and analyze diverse reading materials in order to use English more effectively in academic settings.
- Write narrative, descriptive, and expository paragraphs (8-12 sentences in length) that develop a topic in a clear coherent and unified manner.
- Write multiple paragraphs that focus on a single idea and use appropriate transition to link ideas.
- Demonstrate knowledge of Intermediate vocabulary and word analysis.
- Select appropriate reading strategies to comprehend a variety of texts.
- Find the main idea of readings and respond to articles appropriately.
