Catalog Course Description

An examination of the background and involvement of America in the Vietnam War. The course will primarily focus on the American involvement in Southeast Asia, but will also examine the origins of Vietnamese nationalism and the struggle for independence in Vietnam and its global implications and manifestations. A Cold War framework developed early in the course will be utilized to understand U.S. involvement in the Vietnam War. The course will conclude with an assessment of the long-term effects of the Vietnam War on American society and the rest of the world. 54 lecture hours.

- reason, analyze, compare and contrast reasons for American entry into the Vietnam War and Vietnamese perspectives on the war
- understand the impact of the Vietnam War on American society today
- weigh evidence and evaluate the controversies surrounding the war in Vietnam
- draw lessons from the Vietnam era to better understand the nature of foreign policy in America

USE OF HISTORY: How historically accurate was the film? Can one learn something significant about history from watching this film? Why or why not? Do you feel like you know more about the life in the United States having watched this film? 4. PERSONAL ASSESSMENT: Would you recommend this film to fellow students and any final comments you want to make concerning the film.
