Catalog Course Description

An overview of French culture and civilization which provides an interdisciplinary understanding of the French people, the Francophonie, and their contributions to the world. Guest lectures and weekly field trips to historical sites in and around Paris are part of the teaching process. 54 lecture hours.

- Demonstrate critical comparisons between what they observe and learn about French society and their home culture and society.
- Appraise and relate key cultural and historical sites in France to their historical and cultural context.

Suggested Reading Other Than Required Textbook
