Catalog Course Description

Title IX has afforded women and girls a wealth of opportunities to participate in sport and the broader society. As we move toward gender equity in sport, research has shown that these increased opportunities have had a tremendous impact on the mental, physical, social, and moral development of young girls. This course will analyze the relationship between gender and sport from multiple perspectives in addition to investigating the economic, cultural, political, social, and educational influences on women in sport and the impact that women have as active participants within a predominantly male sphere. 54 lecture hours.

- Understand the significance of several historical achievements for women in sport.
- Apply course content gained to better quantify their own sport/ exercise experience.

3 pages single spaced: Describe opportunities and challenges that exist for women (based on sex or gender expression) to participate in sport today. You may choose from the following environments: secondary, postsecondary, amateur, or professional athletic environments.

Examples of Outside Assignments

Student is to complete a 1 page single spaced analysis of the type of descriptive language used when sports commentators remark of male athletes versus female athletes in the same sport.

Student should pay particular attention to and remark upon language that ties athleticism or movement to gender or descriptions that describe the person versus the athlete as the subject of discussion.

Requirements: must choose a sport/level that allows both sexes to participate. Must use similar format for both reviews (e.g. using video or articles written to compare your male and female sporting event or figure).
