Catalog Course Description

A survey of jazz music. This course provides an opportunity to explore jazz music, its origins, its many styles, and some of the great names whose artistry influenced its development. The effect of jazz on other musical forms such as classical and rock & roll will be explored as well. 54 lecture hours.

Course Objectives

- discuss the origins of jazz, from its African roots, through its early stages in ragtime and blues, and its later manifestations in Big Band, swing, Be Bop, cool jazz, and free jazz
- recognize the various styles of jazz and its musical structure, and identify the instruments most often associated with its performance
- identify the major performers and composers who helped to develop jazz as its own musical form
