Catalog Course Description

Open to all students capable of sustaining a vocal harmony part at an intermediate level. Instruction in choral literature for the large choral ensemble. Special attention is given to choral tone production, phrasing and interpretation. Fundamental sight singing, solfege, and music theory will be covered. Participation in public performances is required. 54 lecture hours, 18 lab hours arranged.

Course Objectives

- Have an understanding from a historical perspective of choral literature composed at an intermediate level in a variety of musical periods
- Be familiar with the analysis of different voice types, their timbres and ranges in the choral setting
- Accurately describe and demonstrate improvement in intermediate level vocal skills for repertoire in larger choirs
- · Have developed traits of leadership in a group setting.
