Catalog Course Description

Traditional uses of photographic production will be challenged through non-traditional and conceptual project production. Artists' works that have influenced the photographic field will be explored thought the process of image description, interpretation and judgment to reflect broader issues in visual culture. Material fee. 36 lecture hours, 72 lab hours.

Course Objectives

- Challenge traditional uses of photographic production through conceptual and non-traditional project production.
- Describe and evaluate the emotional, symbolic and/or narrative content of photographic images.
- Summarize socio-cultural factors that influence the production of photographic images and analyze the socio-cultural impact of these images on society.
- Analyze the relationship between form and content in photographic images.
- Compose photographic images demonstrating solutions to visual problems involving evaluation of aesthetics and conceptual issues.
