Catalog Course Description

The course is an introduction to psychology as an empirical science involving a synthesis of theory and research within the domains of behavior, cognition and affect. Students are expected to work and participate using critical thinking skills, thoughtful analysis/synthesis of readings, presentations and discussions within the class environment. 54 lecture hours.

- assess the the scope, research findings, and major societal, professional and theoretical issues found in the field of psychology.
- measure the importance of the scientific values of research methodologies and objective analyses applied during the process of investigating behavior, cognition and affect.
- value the personal empowerment derived through an understanding of our individual beliefs and actions as well as the beliefs and actions of others in an extremely diverse world.
- consider the crucial importance of preparation and involvement in further study of the multifaceted discipline of psychology.
- Recognize and appraise the significance of perceiving and judging others by virtue of race, ethnicity, religion and culture.

Examples of Required Writing Assignments

RESEARCH PAPER: An eight-page, double-spaced typewritten research paper on a topic relevant to PSY 101 is required. It is about "researching" original peer-reviewed scientific research found ONLY in professional journal articles; you then distill the information, in your OWN words, following the American Psychological Association's (APA) format for writing a scientific, as opposed to a literary paper. The research paper is due no later than one week before the final exam.
