Catalog Course Description

A beginning course introducing the techniques of improvisation to enhance character development. Focus is on group expression, problemsolving, focus, imagination, concentration and spontaneity with and without dramatic text. 54 lecture hours.

Course Objectives

- Demonstrate a beginning understanding of how character traits can be developed through spontaneous interaction.
- Demonstrate a beginning understanding of how a character's psychology can deepen through role playing in unique and diverse settings.
- Develop the basic tools necessary to create character background and character relationships from a neutral canvas.
- Demonstrate a basic knowledge of physical exercises that heighten concentration.
- Demonstrate a basic knowledge of how props and furniture are not obstacles but tools to be used in creating a dynamic activity.
- Utilize the 'senses' of looking, listening, seeing, touching, smelling and tasting in order to enrich characterizations.
- Utilize beginning problem-solving exercises in order to strengthen actable actions in pursuit of character objectives.
