Catalog Course Description

A more detailed study of the fundamental techniques required in acting before the camera in film and television in contrast to the variance from stage work. Students will address areas of scripted monologues, blocking, memorization, basic audition techniques, voice-overs, ADR techniques and the concept of Continuity. 54 lecture hours, 36 lab hours.

Course Objectives

- · Refine and execute terminology unique to acting before a camera.
- Create more specific characterizations unique to camera performance.
- A deeper understanding of "green screen' technique, movement on the set and the differences between voice projection for the stage and voice projection for the camera.

Major Course Content

 - a. Technique and movement
 - b. Blocking
 - c. Studying and breaking down monologues from a shooting script
 - d. Working with a director
 - e. Introduce ADR techniques and Voice Over
 - f. Develop Continuity and Matching Action skills
 - g. Refine "Hitting Your Mark"
 - h. Refine "Green Screen"
- 3. Audition Interview Tehniques
 - a. Prepared vs. Cold Reading of material
- 4. Marketing Strategies
 - a. Headshots/resumes/letters of inquiry

Lab Content

- 1. Observing more complex filmed performances
 - a. period pieces, dramatic, horror, comedic
- 2. Film scripted monologues

- 3. Various Acting Exercises
 - Build upon Meisner, Eric Morris and Stella Adler techniques and add Uta Hagen, Viola Spolin and Cecily Berry
