Catalog Course Description

A build upon the skills developed in content introduced in Camera Acting I and II. A more intense and comprehensive introduction to specific performance, terminology, working in studio and on location front-ofcamera experience. Skills addressed are given circumstances, casting/ director workshops, and the division of labor on television and film sets. 54 lecture hours, 36 lab hours.

Course Objectives

- · Deepen and execute terminology unique to acting before a camera.
- Create more specific characterizations unique to camera performance focusing on 'moment to moment' behavior, personalization and substitution.
- · Build upon the complexities of set blocking.
- Build upon the complexities of "green screen" performance.

Major Course Content

- 1. Terminology and vocabulary
- 2. A build upon Acting for the Single Camera
 - a. Technique and movement
 - b. Blocking
 - c. Studying and breaking down scenes from a shooting script
 - d. Becoming "director proof".
 - e. Focus on Given Circumstances to develop complex characterizations
 - f. Discuss "instinctual behavior" and how that applies to scripted material
 - Build upon "Hitting Your Mark" and "Green Screen" performance techniques
- 3. Audition Interview Technique
 - a. Casting/Director workshops
 - b. In-class "mock" interviews and casting sessions
- 4. Marketing Strategies

a. Discuss various roles and responsibilities and the division of labor on television and film sets.

Lab Content

- 1. Create and present a variety of "mock' interview/audition situations.
- A continuation of observing complex filmed performances in a variety of genres.
- 3. Film scripted scenes
- 4. Build upon Meisner, Eric Morris, Stella Adler, Uta Hagen, Viola Spolin and Cecily Berry and add Gordon Hunt and Robert Cohen
